


Khayal-e-Hir, Imagining Hir, High Holborn

Vestiges is a installation exhibition by Abi Perkins (she/they). It showcases photographs screen printed onto latex with plastic-covered walls and furniture, all in black ink and connected by chains.

The structural choices extend beyond aesthetics, exploring a theme of attachment to the past and a contemplation of the new. The exhibition serves as a celebration and ornamentation of a frozen moment in time, symbolising a space once inhabited and now adorned to reflect the artist's current identity and practice. It communicates a narrative between the past and present.
